John Jay College invites applications for its Graduate Fellowship Program in Digital Forensics and Cybersecurity. The fellowship is part of a collaborative effort between John Jay and NYU-Poly to educate the next generation of cybersecurity researchers who need to understand the complex interplay between computer security and forensics, economics, public policy and law. The program is sponsored by a NSF IGERT award obtained in collaboration with NYU-Poly's computer science department. The fellowship will be awarded to a graduate with a computer science or closely related background who plans to pursue doctoral studies in computer security.

Tuition + Stipend. The fellowship award is for full-time study by a citizen or permanent resident and will provide tuition support and an annual tax-free stipend of up to \$25,000 over four semesters. The Fellow will join John Jay's graduate program in Digital Forensics and Cybersecurity in preparation for doctoral study. We offer a Master of Science degree that integrates computer science with criminal justice, information assurance and digital forensics. While pursuing the M.S. degree, the trainee will do thesis research and work as a research assistant with faculty at John Jay College and NYU-Poly. The fellowship offers students the unique opportunity to become active in research early in their graduate careers as they prepare for doctoral studies. Female and minority candidates are encouraged to apply.

To Apply:

Apply to the D4CS program online at www.jjay.cuny.edu. All required documents should be received by May 15, 2013. The three required letters of reference should be from faculty who can speak to the applicant's suitability for future doctoral studies in computer security.

When you apply for the D4CS degree program online, you must also email a letter of interest in the IGERT Fellowship to Professor Richard Lovely, Director of D4CS, at rlvely@jjay.cuny.edu. This letter should supplement the personal statement required with the online application.
